



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


In the 2nd quarter of 2020 (March to June) the US lost about 1 year's worth of GDP growth. In the same time period, Illinois lost about 14 months of growth.

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


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A. Spending Changes by Income Quartile: 2019 vs 2020



Early in the pandemic (through at least June 2020) consumer spending fell more in relatively high income areas compared to low income areas.




The figure plots the 7-day moving average of consumer spending for the lowest and highest zip code tabulation areas median household income quartiles in 2020 and 2019.

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Percent of businesses that reported pandemic had a moderate or large negative effect by state and week





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
Illinois counties that border Missouri



7 day moving average of ratio of merchants_all in IL and border county. Source: Chetty et. al. 2020 Values greater than 3 or less than -3 are truncated

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
Illinois counties that border lowa
